Finding Camelot has been, and still is, the biggest step in my continuing rehabilitation. There is nothing quite as rewarding as finding myself in a saddle and bonding with a horse again. Especially when the

two of us become one, maneuvering through the courses at Camelot.

The biggest lesson I had to learn was trust; trust in knowing that ultimately I am the one in control of the success or failure of those caring for me. I had to learn to trust in my coaches, volunteers and horse. Even though my spirit beams free and peaceful when I'm in the saddle, I had to

learn to trust a horse carrying me again. I also had to learn to trust being a part of a working team. It's different than being a part of a competitive team. The goal is not about winning points, but controlling myself and my mount. I relearned to use my body to send subtle cues to my mount, and from that I relearned how to balance my mind and body in everyday things I took for granted,

like standing and brushing my teeth.
