have dreams," and the words resonated within me. The road to 'becoming' is not always clear cut and well defined. For some, it takes many years to understand their true calling and to turn that dream into reality. I

had my 'ah-ha' moment when I taught my very first therapeutic horseback riding lesson at the National Ability Center in Park City, Utah. It was in September, 2002. Many pieces came together, and the direction my life would take was suddenly very clear.

I would like to share with you one woman's dream and the drive she possesses that made her dream become a reality, too. In 2010, Ms. Alicia Draper made the decision she wanted to become a PATH Intl. (Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International) certified horseback riding instructor.

I don't want to get ahead of myself as her story really begins in 1994. That is when Alicia first came to Camelot. As an impressionable young lady, eager to soak up everything she could, Alicia had the great fortune to be a student of Eileen Szychowski, Camelot's founder. Alicia was a student until the year 2000, when, as it does for many, life took a turn, and college captured her attention. I want to think that during her time being mentored by Szychowski was when the seed was first planted that would compel Alicia to dedicate years of her life to make a place for herself in the therapeutic horseback riding industry. Alicia went to college, but she did not forget about Camelot. In 2010, she picked up the phone and called me to ask about volunteer opportunities. I was quick to tell her that she was welcome; she joined the volunteer staff, and her new education began.

Alicia worked alongside other volunteers through the long, hot summer months, and when fall arrived, she rejoined the rider schedule so that she could hone her horsemanship skills. Her mentorship transitioned from student to learning how to become a teacher. Over the course of the next eight years

while volunteering her time at Camelot, Alicia obtained her Equine Science Degree from Scottsdale Community College and completed two internships - the first, a five-month internship at Horses Help, a therapeutic riding facility located in Phoenix, Arizona, and the second, a two-week internship at Freedom Riders, a therapeutic program located in Topanga Canyon, California. Alicia volunteered for a year at Stable Influence Charity Programs, a therapeutic riding program in Cave Creek, Arizona, audited a PATH Intl. therapeutic riding instructor workshop in Oceanside, California, began horse driving lessons at the Phoenix Zoo, and volunteered at Therapeutic Riding of Tucson (TROT).

In March, 2019, Alicia attended a PATH Intl. certification workshop in Oceanside, California, where she successfully completed and obtained her PATH Intl. Registered Instructor Certification! A certification that less than a dozen other people with disabilities hold. What an accomplishment for Alicia and an outstanding day for all. Alicia worked hard, she studied harder, and she went to California prepared and ready to succeed. And, succeed she did!

It brings me unbridled joy to announce that this fall Ms. Alicia Draper will be joining my staff as a riding instructor. Dreams can and do come true. I am so very proud of all the hard work that Alicia has put into achieving this goal. The full measure of this monumental accomplishment will be seen in the years to come. Hippotherapy was recommended to us, and it was a no-brainer knowing the love Kiara had for horses...what wasn't a no-brainer was finding a place that either took our insurance or we could afford. Enter Camelot...and enter Mary Hadsall (a real life super-hero in our eyes); from our first visit we felt the love and care...A place where Kiara is celebrated for her ABILITY and challenged to push herself in the areas where she needs to build strength. A place where love looks like countless volunteers serving and giving time and resources to see all people from young to old have the opportunity to push themselves to get stronger, and enjoy the beauty of horsemanship. We have encountered many challenges since our world was turned upside down with a pediatric cancer diagnosis...but we have also encountered many blessings. One of those blessings is the Camelot family that we now belong to...a place where we all are included. A community of people working hard to love those who require some extra time and attention to accomplish things that a lot of us take for granted.
